### Advice for authors.

In general terms the journal follows Oxford's style recommendations. They can be accessed, for example, via the following web page:

As a rule:

1. Try to keep the use of capital letters to a minimum.
2. Italicise non-English words.
3. Use footnotes rather than endnotes.
4. Refer to books as follows:

5. Refer to chapters in books as follows:

P. Green, 'Reconciliation and Forgiveness in Divided Societies: a Path of Courage, Compassion, and Commitment' in A. Kalayjian and R.F. Paloutzian (eds.), *Forgiveness and Reconciliation. Psychological Pathways to Conflict Transformation and Peace Building*. Heidelberg: Springer, 2010, p. 252

6. Refer to articles as follows:

I. Ijabs, 'Strange Baltic Liberalism: Paul Schiemann's Political Thought Revisited', *Journal of Baltic Studies* 40 (2009) pp. 495–515.

7. When referring to web pages, please give the full web address, the date the page was accessed and any other information that might be useful to someone trying to find the same page.

8. Please make sure your contribution to the journal comes complete with:

- a) a brief abstract, and
- b) a short biography at the end which should include some contact details.
